Wrong Answers, Great Learning

Inventor Thomas Edison said that he did not fail at making the light bulb one thousand times, but rather that "the light bulb was an invention with 1,000 steps." Basketball great Michael Jordan said "I've missed more than 9,000 shots in my career. I've lost almost 300 games. 26 times I've been trusted to take the game's winning shot and missed. I've failed over and over again in my life. That is why I succeed." Making mistakes is a natural part of all learning. Those who we consider to be "great" are clear that mistakes lead to learning. The latest research shows that mistakes are an essential part of learning. Far too often, students are turned off from learning because they fear mistakes. This usually happens because mistakes are seen as bad or a failure. When a person makes an error in anything and they have the opportunity to learn from it, they develop a much stronger understanding. Research states that students learn more from making mistakes than from getting all the right answers. So when you check on your child's schoolwork and identify that they have made errors, it offers insight into what understanding your child has about that topic. It provides an opportunity for you to talk to the child about what they know, and ask questions to stretch their thinking around where they are currently developing their understanding. This conversation helps to develop the crucial skills of reasoning and communication. When you support an attitude that values learning from mistakes, you are telling your child that mistakes are a valuable and natural ingredient in learning and lead to deeper understanding. Research shows that this attitude supports stronger achievement!






Remember to Keep a Positive Attitude and Growth Mindset

Talk about the maths you do at work.

Visit museums and galleries and make notes of the shapes and the numbers in art and architecture.

Read books about mathematics, famous scientists or mathematicians. Look for the maths in shapes (in pictures) and numbers (three bears), and physically point them out or count them out loud. make the maths obvious.

It is OK for children to use their fingers, in fact research shows that it's a good thing.

Ask about strategies they use at school such as doubling numbers or adding one more.


